

# Using NYS Education Law §259 to ensure sustainable funding



# PUTNAM VALLEY LIBRARY A HISTORY OF SERVICE

Beginning in 1929 in a kitchen, the Library was chartered in 1937 and moved to its present home in 1968 – a tissue paper mill-turned toothpick factory-turned to the Putnam Valley Lodge – and then to its current incarnation.



## FAQS ABOUT THE VOTE

#### **1.** Why is the library pursuing a §259 funding proposition on the school ballot?

New York State Education Law §259(1)(b) allows association libraries to have a proposition placed on the school ballot. If the vote passes, then the library funding will be determined directly by the taxpayers.

#### 2. Is the library budget part of the school budget?

**No!** The library budget is a separate line and is not part of the school budget. The school district will collect the taxes for the library according to the law, but the library and the school district are separate entities.

#### 3. Will the library budget be on the school ballot every year?

**No!** The library will need to petition the school district in order to have a §259 proposition on the school ballot.

#### 4. Does the library budget increase each year?

**No!** The library budget will remain the same unless there is another §259 vote. Sustainable funding will allow for long range planning for the library.

#### 5. What will happen if the vote does not pass?

We will continue to have no idea what our budget will be from year to year, making it impossible to plan for the future. The library will have to make further cuts to resource purchases and services. The opening hours may have to be cut back as well. The library infrastructure will continue to deteriorate.





Only this time, Chicken Little is telling the truth. The Library's skylight is rated to last for 25 years – it's been towering over the circulation floor for nearly double that – and its replacement is at the top of our infrastructure fix list.


Even with a partial State construction grant, which is a third of our cost; it will take more than \$100,000 to complete the project. This will eat up most of the Library's reserves.

#### And then the trees fell!

The March storm blew down multiple, huge, old-growth trees that fell across the waterway and crushed our safety guard rail. Repairs require the trees to be removed, the guardrail replaced, and the resulting root sinkhole to be filled.

# **OUR MOST URGENT NEEDS:**

- Replace the skylight and repair a large portion of roof
- Replace failing HVAC system, including A/C units, boilers, radiators
- Repair faulty plumbing throughout the building
- Upgrade elevator so moms with strollers may get to Children's Floor
- Bring safety escape doors and exits into compliance
- Bring the library into compliance with the requirements of the Americans for Disabilities Act
- Replace outdated (13-year-old) computers for public and staff use
- Upgrade Wi-Fi and extend its range



# With sustainable funding we can:

- Increase hours: stay open longer on weekdays, add another evening and even open on Sunday afternoons
- Hire an additional Youth Services staff member
- Maximize and update space/community room for library programs and to offer to the public
- Add up-to-date audio-visual tech to the community room for programs and community events
- Expand our Library of Things: more museum passes, increase our fishing supplies, add Things like microscopes, bird watching kits, seed bank, laptops, cooking equipment, yard tools, sewing tools – we leave it to your imagination!

- Develop our outdoor areas for library and community use


#### FUNDING

#### How is the library funded now?

Currently, the Town of Putnam Valley contracts for library services on an annual basis. This provides the library with the largest portion of its funding. Small amounts of funding are received from Putnam County, donations, and grants. A §259 vote would provide the library with a <u>guaranteed and stable amount of funding</u> from year to year as decided by the community. It would no longer contract with the town and any overlap of funds will be rebated to the Town. *NO DOUBLE DIPPING!* Funding for Putnam Valley Library

#### Is the library asking for a budget increase?

Yes, the library has an annual contract for 2023 with the Town of Putnam Valley for \$347,650. The §259 vote requests \$460,000. This will allow the library to restore resources and hours, enhance services for the community, and complete overdue building maintenance.


#### How much will I pay for library services?

The taxed amount depends on the assessed value of your property. For a property assessed at \$400,000, the cost will increase by about \$4.00 per month (based on 2022 total taxable assessed values). The increase is only on what you're now paying for the Library.



# WHO GETS TAXED?

#### When the vote passes, will part of the 2023 contract be returned to the Town of Putnam Valley?

Yes. The Library will return the overlapping portion of the 2023 contract fund to the Town of Putnam Valley. **NO DOUBLE DIPPING!** 

#### Will the §259 vote change who can use the Library?

No, anyone who resides, works, or goes to school in Putnam Valley will be able to get a Library card. This has always been the case and will not change.

#### Is the taxable area going to be different?

Yes, Library taxes will be paid by residents who reside in the Putnam Valley School District. This includes a small area in Cortlandt Manor. Conversely, Putnam Valley homeowners in the Mahopac and Haldane school districts will no longer be "double-taxed."

## WHY KEEP THE LIBRARY OPEN? WE CAN JUST USE MAHOPAC!

#### Uh, no!

Libraries are a public good, like schools. We all contribute so that equitable access to essential services are possible.

The Libraries of the Mid-Hudson Library System operate under a state-approved Free Direct Access Plan. Therefore, overuse of another community's library by individuals from a town either with or without their own library is regulated and can lead to restrictions for residents who are not adequately funding their own library.

The Mahopac Library has been supported by the taxpayers of their school district for many years. In that community the per capita cost is over \$110 annually. Why should another community underwrite the use of their library for residents of another town that is not pulling their own weight in supplying library services?

The ability to use other libraries is only thanks to the cooperative lending agreements facilitated by the Mid-Hudson Library System and thanks to NYS regulations, and it requires each community to support its own library to ensure fairness in the cooperative agreements.
